for International
Military Chaplains**

Military chaplains play a vital role in the lives of military personnel in nations around the globe, and ACCTS provides training and encouragement to international chaplains -- some of whom receive little to no guidance for their roles.

ACCTS’ mission is to develop Christian leaders in the armed forces of the world and help military Christian fellowships form and grow. An important part of this mission is Chaplains Interaction -- our intensive, two-week course in the basic principles of chaplaincy.

International participants learn about universal principles of chaplaincy, leadership, military ethics, managing operational stress, ministering to a pluralistic military society, and commander/chaplain relationships.

Meeting and interacting with active-duty US military chaplains is an important aspect of the experience, as the international delegates learn about the challenges of chaplaincy in today’s military, and discuss how to meet the demands of operational ministry.

Interaction and discussion between the international chaplains adds another unique and important dimension to this training program, as participants talk about common problems they face and how to deal with them.

Previous participants have come from nations as diverse as Bangladesh, Colombia, Croatia, Honduras, Jordan, South Korea, Uganda, and Zimbabwe.
